"[T]here he sat upon a stone outside, his grey eyes dancing with amusement as they fell upon my astonished features." *The Hound of the Baskervilles* (1902).

As he spoke he whipped . . . a large round magnifying glass from his pocket. *A Study in Scarlet* (1887).

"His name is Barlow, and the letter was to confirm the appointment." *How Watson Learned the Trick* (1924).

"In an instant I had slipped the revolver from the drawer into my pocket, and was covering him through the cloth." *The Adventure of the Final Problem* (1893).

Holmes opened it and smelled the single cigar which it contained. "Oh, this is a Havana, and these others are cigars of the peculiar sort which are imported by the Dutch from their East Indian colonies. They are usually wrapped in straw, you know, and are thinner for their length than any other brand." *The Adventure of the Resident Patient* (1893).

"Mathews, who knocked out my left canine in the waiting-room at Charing Cross . . ." *The Adventure of the Empty House* (1903).
