## ROUND ONE

### *The Stone Cold Quiz*

1. Justice Stone was nominated to the Supreme Court by two Presidents, one a Republican and the other a Democrat. Name them.
2. At Cold Stone Creamery, on what kind of stone is the ice cream mixed?
3. Justice Stone is the only Justice to have occupied all nine seniority positions on the Supreme Court. Applying their current seniority rankings, solve the following equation:  $(\text{Thomas} + \text{Kagan}) \times (\text{Jackson} - \text{Alito}) = \underline{\hspace{2cm}}$ .

4. “Stone Cold” Steve Austin won this championship six times.
5. Justice Stone’s college mascot would officially be a mammoth today, but was informally Lord Jeff nearer the time of his attendance. Name the school.
6. This musical artist released the song “Stone Cold” in 2015 as part of the Grammy Award winning certified platinum pop album “Confident.” You might also have caught her playing the guest role of Dani on the fifth season of Glee.
7. Justice Stone was Dean of this law school from 1910 to 1923, home to Karl Llewellyn and, in an earlier incarnation, Chancellor James Kent.
8. This Seattle Seahawks linebacker – aka “The Boz” – was drafted out of Oklahoma in 1987 after being kicked off his college team for wearing a T-shirt to the Orange Bowl that read “NCAA: National Communists Against Athletes.” He retired from the NFL due to injury after two seasons, and went on to an acting career in which he debuted starring in the 1991 action flic “Stone Cold” (Rotten Tomatoes freshness rating: 33%). Name him.
9. Justice Stone was the twelfth Chief Justice. Name the first, and the eleventh.
10. “Carl’s Stone Cold Lock of the Century ... Of The Week” provided irreverent commentary on current sports events from 2007 to 2015 on this late night segment of Cartoon Network, which is specifically targeted at young adults.

**ROUND TWO**

*The Rolling Stone Quiz*

1. In the 1930s, Justice Stone typically voted with a Supreme Court faction – known as the Three Musketeers – that consistently voted to uphold the constitutionality of New Deal legislation. For one point each, name the other two Musketeer Justices, and name Alexandre Dumas’ *Les Trois Mousquetaires*.
2. Name the song that contains this lyric: “Now for ten years we’ve been on our own / And moss grows fat on a rollin’ stone.”

3. For one point each, identify the popular name given to the Justices of the Supreme Court that consistently opposed the Three Musketeers, name each of the relevant Justices, and identify the source from which their moniker was drawn.
4. This white-clad *Lord of the Rings* character states in *Return of the King* that Tom Bombadil “is a moss gatherer, and I have been a stone doomed to rolling.”
5. Justice Stone’s *Ex Parte Quirin* decision concerned the adjudicative treatment of foreign saboteurs. For one point each, name the country that sent the saboteurs, and the two states in which they first entered the United States.
6. A jury awarded \$3 million in defamation damages against *Rolling Stone* magazine to the associate dean of this university for publishing a defamatory 2014 article that accused the dean of mishandling a campus sexual assault.
7. Justice Stone’s first name was the last name of two other Justices, including one known as The Great Dissenter. For one point each, name those two Justices, and give their relationship to one another.
8. The Rolling Stones’ “Gimme Shelter” says that \_\_\_\_ is just a shot away, and that \_\_\_\_ is just a kiss away (one point each).
9. Justice Stone’s famous footnote four in *Carolene Products* addressed a product called Milnut. What were its two primary components?
10. Name the member of the Rolling Stones who had his last child, Devereaux Octavian Basil \_\_\_\_, at age 73. For a bonus point each, name Devereaux’s mother and her profession.
